RURAL EXPOSURE CAMP REPORT

19th November 2018 to 24th November 2018

The rural outreach programme of this academic year comprised the students of I M.Sc. Statistics, I M.Sc. Zoology and II BBA France was scheduled from 19th November 2018 to 24th November 2018. The Camp was held at the village Mangalapuram of Villupuram district. The P.M.D.(People Multipurpose Development) Society in the village assisted us in conducting the rural exposure programme.

Mangalapuram

Mangalapuram is a small village/hamlet in Kanai block in Villupuram district of Tamil Nadu, India. It comes under Kakkanur Panchayat and Vikravandi Taluk. It is located 16 Kilometres towards east of VillupuramandKoliyanur Block.

Villupuram, Tirukkoyilur, Panruti, Tindivanam are the nearby cities to Mangalapuram. Tamil is the local language here. CPM,DMK are the major political parties in this area. Most of the villagers belongs to Dalit Christian Community. Almost everyone in the village depends upon farming for their daily needs.

Villupuram belongs to Vikravandi Assembly Constituency. Villupuram is the Loksabha Constituency of Mangalapuram.

PMD: Missionaries of Mangalapuram

PMD Society (People's Multipurpose Development Society) was founded by the first generation of Dalit graduates in Mangalapuram Village in the year 1975. The main focus of PMD is on Agriculture, Education, Women Empowerment and Health of the Villagers. Through the fulfilment of basic needs of the rural poor, the society achieved a prominent

space among them. By introducing Self-help Groups they empower the village to become self-sufficient as well as they protect the interest of Dalits, women and children.

The faculties who accompanied us for the camp are Prof.Melson, Dr.Anand, Asst. Prof.Ratna of the Department of Service Learning, Prof.Jelin of Zoology Department and Prof.Arockiasamy, Prof.Selva Arul Pandian of Statistics department.

MANUAL WORK (9:00 a.m. – 12:30 p.m.)

To make the students realise the efforts and experience underwent by the labourers and agricultural workers, students were made to work for three hours. The work done by the students included cleaning the canal connected to the pond, ploughing and sowing seedlings in the field.

VILLAGE VISIT (2:30 -5:30 pm)

One of the activities that emotionally moved the students was visiting the nearby villages and interacting with the villagers. The purpose of this activity was to make the students realize the real life situationvillage people and how they find happiness and satisfaction in little things they had.

LOCAL RESOURCE PERSONS (6:00-8:00 pm)

In these sessions resource persons joined the student community and shared their experiences and opinion, they also answered questions raised by the students.

Since the theme of the first day was labour, agricultural and non-agricultural workers were brought in and were made to interact with the students. The followings days interaction between the Women of Mangalapuram and former Panchayath president were held for approximately one hour. These sessions were actively participated by the students.

GROUP ACTIVITIES(9:00- 10:30 pm)

The first activity was held only for the PG students and the activity was an ice-breaking hour. After this activity students were divided into four groups namely Prayer and Cultural, Food, Time Management and Documentation. All these groups were asked to perform an act.

The next group activity was held for all and it was about building model village.

Students worked enthusiastically and were committed to their work. Throughout the camp all these groups did their own responsibilities in the level best.

EVALUATION

This session involved recalling all the experiences that took place that particular day by various students .

RECAP SESSION

After the exercise session, the documentationteam presented the report of the previous events.

OFFICIALS' VISIT

On the third day of our camp the official team from our college consisting Fr. Andrew the Principal, Fr. Louie Albert Fr. Ignasi Muthu and Fr. Justin Prabu.

The words made by them during the meeting really inspired all of us. We had the honour of felicitating Fr.Principal in the silver jubilee year of his priestly Ordination with his relatives.

Rural Exposure Visit- Alambadi, Villupuram District

19th November 2018-24th November 2018

<u>DAY 1</u>

We left Chennai on 19/11/2018 to Villupuram by train, and then to Alampadi by bus.

We reached the camp before lunchtime, unpacked and settled down. We had a Guest Lecture by Mr.Nicholas from the IRDS (Integrated Rural Development Society). He gave us a brief introduction about the IRDS and shared some of his knowledge and experience.

We then proceeded to have an ice breaking session to get to know all the members, including the staff. Post the ice breaking, we split into groups, each of which was assigned a role. These were – Documentation, Food, Time Management, Prayer and Relaxation, Cultural and Cleaning.

We then broke for the day.

<u>DAY 2</u>

The day started with a prayer session. A song was sung and a member of the Prayer and breakfast group conducted the prayer service.

This was followed by an exercise session which included Yoga, breathing exercises and stretches. We then proceeded to have breakfast.

Post breakfast, we split into our designated groups and headed out to the villages.

We conducted pond cleaning at PilrampattuVilage, Vaddakaraitharezhinor, Thanikalampattu, Oduvankuppam. We cleaned a school premise at Melvaalai.

Tea was served on site and lunch was served at a villager's house.

Post lunch, everyone headed out to interview the villagers. We asked various questions to get a better understanding of village life, social structure etc.

We then headed back to the camp. Here, after a short tea break, we had a guest lecture by Mrs. Vanaja. She spoke about the issues faced by farmers in the modern age.

Post Guest lecture, we had a sharing session, where each group sent representatives to share their experience of the manual labour and village visit. We then broke for lunch and met up again for another session. After a short recap, we broke for the day

<u>DAY 3</u>

We followed the same routine, prayer service was conducted and we did stretches and played some exercise games.

After breakfast, we headed out to the villages again. The work was similar to the previous days, most of it included cleaning and weeding. We conducted cleaning at lakes, Mother TeresaIllam, a temple and a Church.

Post lunch, we headed out to the villages again to interact with the villagers.

We returned to the camp in the evening. Rev. Fr. Principal came to visit the camp along with Rev. Fr. Louie Albert, Fr. Ignaci and Fr. Prabhu.

Each team chose a representative to speak about their experience and how the outreach had affected them and the same was presented to the Rev. Fr. Principal.

After the presentation, Father and his team gave a short address to the camp members regarding the aim of outreach by Loyola College, and its importance in accordance with the Jesuit principles. We then had a group photo session and another presentation by Mr. Nicholas. He answered any queries we had regarding the villages and more.

After this, the groups came up with ideas for the cultural event and after dinner, the session for the day was closed.

<u>DAY 4</u>

The morning session proceeded smoothly. We had the prayer and exercise and then proceeded to have breakfast.

We then headed out to the village. We finished our assigned tasks at the various villages, such as the pond cleaning, temple cleaning, school cleaning etc. We also planted seeds at a farm

Post lunch we went on a village tour to study the village topology. We explored the village and explored its social hierarchies. We also interacted with the villagers and kids.

After the tour we returned back and practised for the cultural event.

The evening session consisted of a group activity where each group had to draw their ideal village in a chart sheet and explain the vision behind it. We closed the day after a brief discussion about the cultural event.

<u>DAY 5</u>

The day began as usual, with prayer and exercise. We conducted prayer service with songs and proceeded with the exercise session. We did breathing exercises and stretches.

We then had a practise session for the cultural events. The groups presented their acts, this included songs, skits etc.

We broke for lunch and then had a documentary screening. It focussed on the pains inflicted on farmers by the upper caste landlords.

After the screening, Mr.Savari from the IRDS, talked about the Ambedkar Federation, a fraction of the IRDS fighting for dalit rights.

We had a tea break and the next session began.

The last part of the event included a short session by Brigadier Antony Grossy, from Digital Journalism.

This was followed by the cultural programme where all the teams presented their acts.

<u>DAY 6</u>

We started the day by celebrating the Holy Mass, followed by some exercise.

This was followed by the valedictory function. Mr. Nicholas answered questions from the students and shared some of his knowledge.

The respective group leaders presented a shawl to our guides as a token of gratitude.

PGOUTREACH CAMP

19TH November 2018 to 24th November 2018

Over all summary

The program was conducted at Pulicat and in the surrounding villages. Pulicat is a major fishing based community with few agro based village. During the outreach, the students experienced the hardships and the daily challenges faced by the villagers through manual works and the village visit.

- To give a glimpse of what reality looks like

Report

The Outreach program was conducted at Pulicat near Ponneri from November 19 to 24, for about six days. The departments of Computer Science, Physics and Applied History were grouped together to visit the Pulicat village. The program was conducted by the Department of Social Works under the aegis of FrRev. Dr. A. Louie Albert, S.J., along with Prof. Jaya Prakash, Prof. Rathna and the professors from the respective departments also accompanied the students.

The members of MSSS, Madras Society of Social Services, played host of the students. The program was carried out as planned.

The guidance and the care from the professors and the staffs at the MSSS made a memorable experience for the Loyolites.

Day 1 - November 19th 2018

At 8.30am, we started our journey to Pazhaverkadu village at Thiruvallur district. We reached the place by 12pm.We were accommodated at the Dutch Nursery school a part of the MSSS. At 1pm we were served lunch. The inaugural session started at 3pm, where Rev Fr.Patrick and the volunteers of MSSS(MADRAS SOCIETY OF SOCIAL SERVICE) addressed the gathering.

After the session we had the tea break followed by the ice breaking session. Later the students were separated and grouped into various committees which are "documentation", "time management", "food", "prayer" and "cultural". Among the groups one person from each committee was nominated as the representative to lead the group. Then we had our

supper from 8-9pm.As soon as the dinner we had the review session. After that we went to sleep by 10pm

Day 2 - November 20th 2018

The second day began with prayer session conducted by the prayer committee followed by exercises led by the same group. At about 9.30am we left to the place with our respective groups.

The villages that we were to visit were NaduvoorMaadhaKuppam ,SattanKuppam, KoonaKupakkam and Pakkam. The team members of the documentary team were split up and sent with each of the other groups. The day was divided into two, in the morning we were given little manual works like cleaning among others and in the afternoon we visited individual house in the villages.

The first group that went to the NaduvoorMaadhaKuppam came to know about the culture of the village and their profession, this village was a fishing based community village and thus their way of communication and their very nature looked strong. This group also had visitedJamilabad, a muslim community village in nearby.

The second group went to SattanKuppam, a village that was rehabilitated after the tsunami. Here also the majority were of the fishing community both lake fishers and ocean fishers. They helped in cleaning the Temple and their Primary school. They said that they had learned the value of work.

The third group went to the village named KoonaKuppam, also fishing based village. This group was invested in cleaning the important places of the village like the school and the social gathering spots. They described that they loved the village youth who were very helpful.

The fourth group went to the village named Pakkam, a farming based community. Here the group members were asked to work in the field to remove the weeds in the field. This group worked really hard and had come to know the value of farming.

After this we came back to the Dutch school and had tea and gathered for a review session. Students shared their experience and the day came to an end at 9pm after the dinner.

DAY 3 - November 21st 2018

The third day was delayed due to the rainy weather condition in the morning. The students were not assigned with any field work. In order to compensate, they allotted different cultural activities to every group organised and monitored by cultural committee. For which we had the practice session till 1:00 pm .At 1:30 pm the lunch was provided, as soon the lunch was over every team was sent to village visit to the nearby villages.

The groups were again assigned to different villages to cover the entire village. The first place we visited was Rajarathnam Nagar were we saw the sun dial built in 1915 AD in a mosque. Then we head to the forest office of Pulicat birds sanctuary, which is the second largest brackish water lake in India. And had a look at the information room about the various birds that live and visit the sanctuary. Then we went to a ST village named SenjiammanKuppam, the place to visit, were we visited each house and interacted with the people of the village which is just 10feet away from the river bed. The major occupation of the people is lake fishing in which they earn Rs.200 on daily basis .They don't have proper water facilities and approved land to live .Child marriage is the major issue in the village were both men and women were pushed into the marital concept at their early teens , due to the lack of basis education.

Other teams visited similar villages and interacted with the villagers and learnt new experiences

We were asked to build a model village to demonstrate the planning of the village that we have seen during the visits.

We stayed there till 5:00 pm then we returned to our place. The review session and the personal sharing increased as the there were students who wanted to share their experience

DAY -4 November 22nd 2018

The fourth day started with the wonderful prayer service conducted by that day's prayer group.

On this day a group went to pazhaverkaadu market, which is the center part of that village. At first we entered into the government library which was particularly offered for the student society in that small village. There we can find the different kinds sections specially given for children, students, and women.

Next they went to the Pottery making village that is "Kuyavar Street". They were completely struggling during the rainy season. They provide their own products for the temple festivals.

Then they went to arulmigusreeguberavinayagaaalayam. There we met an ex- village headman he told us about their growth and development inside the village like companies, factories, and others. Then shortly they were going to conduct a job fair with the help of "Confederation of Indian Industry" and even they are going to get the "patta approved land" from the government. They provided public toilets for the people who live in the huts.

Other groups were invested in similar villages. The interaction with people brought many in tears at the end of the day. The day ended with review session and personal sharing

DAY 5 November 23rd 2018

Asusual the day started with the prayer session followed by the breakfast. On that day we were asked to do our field work within the school premises where we stayed. The work started at 9.30pm and ended up at 11.30pm,after a small break we had our lunch.

After the lunch we had our practice session for the cultural activities. Later in the evening at about 4pm we visited the Light house at Pazhaverkadu beach and returned the venue at 5.30pm. By 6.30pm we left to the "Paakam village" in three open tempos, where at about 7.30pm the cultural programme began within the church premises, where all the groups performed various cultural activities like dance, songs and folklores.

It was quite a success and the program ended at 9pm. Then we had a sweet surprise where the villagers took us to their homes and fed us with tasty food filled with love and hospitality. Then we returned to our place by 11pm and the day ended for the students.

DAY 6 November 24th 2018

The last journey of the camp began by the prayer service conducted by the prayer committee members followed by the breakfast. After which all the students gathered in a place along with the staff co-ordinators. The staffs organised a brief review session to the students were every individual was given a chance to open up their own views and reflections about the village during the 5days of rural camp. The staffs advised everyone to practise and continue the life lessons that they had learnt in the outreach programme. This was followed by the Valedictory function, a small ceremony to honour our caretakers and the staffs, which went on from 11.30-12.30pm. All the MSS volunteers were thanked and honoured for their

extraordinary services that they are doing. The day ended with group picture. At about 1pm we left the place and departed towards Loyola College and reached the college by 3pm.

Conclusion

The outreach program was a success on the whole and it taught many of our students a new lesson in their life. We, at the Documentary team, thank the staffs in-charge for the wonderful opportunity provided. On behalf of the respective Departments, we thank the management of Service Learning and our beloved Loyola Institution.

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RURAL EXPOSURE AND RELIEF CAMP – PUDUKOTTAI 2018

A total of 27 students accompanied by two staff members reached at Pudukottai Multipurpose Social Service Society at 4.15 a.m. on 20/11/2018. The day commenced with the inauguration of the Relief Camp at PMSSS. Rev.Fr.James, Director of PMSSS addressed

the gathering and appreciated the students' community for gathering to reach the victims of the cyclone Gaja.

The students were divided into two groups with a staff member in-charge in each group. Around 9.45 a.m. One team left to the Sri Lankan refugee campsituated at Thoppukollai and LenaVilaku.

The students started to interact with the villagers who were found losing their houses and other things to the GAJA cyclone trying to recuperate from their huge loss. The head of the Srilankan Refugee Camp described the history of their arrival to India and expressed his grief over the condition prevailed in the camp. The people were eager to know about the purpose of the visit.

The houses were found damaged where the predominant houses were thatched houses and asbetoss sheet. Electricity was interrupted as the trees have fallen on the electric lines which in turn made their life more complicated with unavailability of basic needs such as food and water.The drinking water was available only after 2 days and it was priced more than Rs.10 which was unaffordable to the people.

The camp comprised of around 500 families which were nuclear in nature and with infants found in most of the households. The vibrant energy flew around the atmosphere when youngsters came together to interact and joined us to initiate the relief activities in the camp. The relief activity commenced by cleaning the debris lying on the streets and damaged houses and the team was helped by the villagerswho were totally shocked by the devastation. Later the teamreturned to the PMSSS by 2.00 p.m. Around 3.30 p.m. the teams started clearing off the wreckages of trees and logs in PMSSS campus.

The teams were gathered to share their views followed by a feedback session at 8.00 p.m. Dr. Raja Mohammed, a renowned Historian was invited to address the students and he briefed the history of Pudukottai District. Thus the day ended with his speech.

The second day was commenced with a Morning Prayer and exercise. We were scheduled to do relief activities at Venkatakulam, a village located 6km from PMSSS. The village consisted of 1000 and above families residing in concrete and tiled houses. Hinduism and Christianity are the two major religion found in the village. The team cleaned the premises of Saint Joseph's boy'sschool until evening and then dispersed as two teams to interact with the villagers. The villagers expressed their sorrows when the teams surveyed the village to understand their psycho-social condition. The place lacked proper roads, had no electricity and water supply from the day of heavy rain. Majority of the villagers work as daily wage earners in agricultural farms/lands for their livelihood and they involve in

cultivating sugarcane, corn, black gram and banana plantation. Apart from agriculture, some were occupied with the teaching profession.

The effect of GAJA has affected the livelihood of the villagersdue to huge logs and branches and the uproot of tamarind trees that were once their source of income. It was found that the villagers were badly in need of psychological support due to the loss of favourable economic and social conditions.

Prof. Devasagayam addressed the students in the feedback session in the evening and deliberated on the importance of Tamil Language with short stories that attracted everyone in the session.

The next day started with clearing the debris at R.C Middle School located near PMSSS which was affected by the cyclone. The school children were inspired and willingly joined hands along with their teachersto help us clean the campus. Everyone around weredelighted and encouraged to see their participation in the relief work. The local corporation laborers also gave hands toclear-out the church and the school campus.

Later the students were taken to Kottaikaddu which is 16 kilometres away from PMSSS. During the journey, the lack of transportation and the people's agitation against the government was witnessed. Though thestudents had a lot of difficulties in reaching the village, the hospitality of St. Joseph Church members and the villagers encouraged us to carry out the relief activity in a full swing.

The village consisted of 300 and more families engaging in agricultural activities as their major source of income. The village was well-structured with concrete houses. The plantation such as Banana, sugarcane, corn, rice, coconut, cotton, jackfruit and lemon were destroyed. They were in rage due to the misfunctioning of the government and the local bodies for their lack of necessary and effective steps to cope up with the damage and their conditions. Student's visit and interaction with them helped them psychologically. The support rendered by the women was a set back for the heads of the family to recover from the damage. So the purpose of the rural exposure was accomplished after getting to know about the rural resilience and sustenance.

The last day, the students involved in cleaning the debris of the church and nearby residential areas and visited Vamban Naal village. The people were devastated as they were in lack of relief materials and also because of their personal losses due to this particular catastrophe which they hadn't experienced till then.

To conclude, the relief camp gave us an opportunity to taste the success of unity by exploring the Delta region. It strengthened the spirit of team work muting our personal identities and ideologies to serve for the community gaining hands-on experience and enhanced the knowledge of various socio-cultural conditions of our brethren in their time of need.

- Puttukottai predominately agriculture dominated district
- Socioeconomic status- Below poverty line families
- Health poor health condition and there was no PHCs
- Education and employment students had to travel to town for schooling but had a common study centre. Apart from agriculture, the people worked as carpenters, painters, masons and daily wage earners. Some worked in part time jobs at textile shops in the town.

PG Relief Camp at PunalVasal-

30th November to 5th December 2018

DAY 1 - REPORT

The day began with the Inaugural session with the presence of Rev.Fr.Vincent, Rev.Fr. Dominic Samuel (Asst. Parish Priest), Rev.Sr.Jayanthi, Rev.Sr.Josephine and our Professors(Mr. Melson, Mr. Baskar Jayabalan, Ms. Princy Christy, Mr. Jacob Davis). Fr.Vincent, the parish priest and correspondent of ArockiyaAnnaiHr Sec School oriented our

students on the aftermath of the GAJA cyclone and its impact on the people in and around Punalvasal. The students were then divided into 4 teams -Time management, Prayer and culturals, Documentary and, Food management following which our students had an ice-breaking session to bring about coordination and team spirit.

Later on, in the evening the students were sent out to study the ground reality of Punalvasal. The students were emotionally taken back on seeing the massive destruction. The villagers poured out their agony, suffering, about this natural disaster that has flipped their lives upside down and has taken them 30 years aback to start all things over again.

During the Input Session in the evening,

- Mrs.Mariyammadescribedthebeautyofthevillageandlamentedaboutt he devastation of property andcattle.

The day ended with a feedback session where 4 of our students shared their personal experiences.

DAY 2 REPORT

The day started with a warm-up session and prayer. The 4 teams were sent to different locations of Punalvasal accompanied by the concerned Professor. Our students began clearing the debris in the streets and the canals. The re-opening of St.Anne's School was scheduled during the weekend so that our students helped them in cleaning the school premises as requested by the school's management.

The Principal Rev. Dr. Andrews SJ.and Rev. Fr. A. Louie Albert - director service learning visited our relief camp and received feedbacks. Their visit encouraged and enhanced our student'senthusiasm.

Then the students visited the village and had some interactions with the villagers. The students created an emotional connect with the villagers and in spite of the heavy loss sustained by them they never compromised on their hospitality.Some boys of the village accompanied our students during their village visit. In a short while, they developed a strong bond and they themselves oriented the students about the places which were affected. An oldman distributed coconuts to all our students to quench their thirst, out of love and affection. The day ended with a feedback session where three students shared their emotional experiences.

DAY 3 REPORT

The day started with a warm-up session and prayer. The 4 teams were sent to different villages (**Poovanam**, **Naduvikurichi**) around Punalvasal to study the ground realities. The students visited families, learned about their plight due to cyclone, consoled them and helped them clear the debris. The students who visited Poovanam Village helped people whose houses were damaged badly to clean up the entire area around theirhouses. The streets in Poovanam were blocked by a logs of trees that were removed by our students. The students had an input session in the afternoon. Mrs. Jasintha along with her daughter Sr.Jeyaseeli, motivated the students on spirituality and gave them insights on being happy alwaysirrespective of life's situations. She also shared a few life experiences on how she overcame the hard phase caused by GAJA cyclone.

Later in the evening, the teams were asked to discuss on the cultural events which was to be held the next day for thehostel children there to inculcate social awareness following which there was a feedback session where students shared their work experience inPoovanam.

DAY 4 REPORT

The day kick started with a warm-up and prayer session. Dr.Jayakumar, (Ottangadu Govt. Veterinary Hospital), a veterinary doctor and an alumni of PunithaArockiaAnnai School, addressed our students regarding the loss of property and cattle. Based on the study the students made on the village, they raised a few queries regarding the compensation and the loss of cattle in and around Punalvasal in order to educate the people in need. The doctor then has presented statistical reports on the compensation allocated by the Government, the loss of cattle and the actual loss of cattlesustained.

Though he is a doctor by profession, his major interest is farming and that made him speak more about the natural resources and thehistory of Cropping pattern (Coconut Trees) followed by the people in Punalvasal.

In the afternoon students were taken to 3 different villages-Poovanam, Punalvasal and Ramakrishnapuram. The students who visited Punalvasal and Poovanam village and during their house visits they decided to fix the roofs of a few houses and covered it with Tarpaulins. An old lady stacked food grains, and eatables for many days in a container as a reserve for the cyclone. On interrogation, the students got to know that this container was the only means for her survival. They felt pity on her and helped her in disposing it and replenished the supplies for a month. Thereafter, the students gathered for culturals rehearsals. The students showcased their skills and talents in educating and motivating the students by presenting on-stage events such as skits, dance, group singing, dubsmash, etc on the following themes, "Darkness to light", "Why Education?", "Students, the changemakers!" , "The Eternal asset - Christ". The children of the village enjoyed the show creatively put up by our students. The day ended with fun, entertainment and learning by imbibing children with social awareness and moral values.

DAY 5 REPORT

On the final day, students had their warm-up and prayer sessions in the morning followed by the evaluation session. Every single student was asked to share his/her personal experiences and also to submit a write-up on what they learned here. Most of the students shared that this outreach stood out as a life-changing experience and helped them gain self realisation.Italsocreatedanimpactandkindledthemindsofthestudents in contributing more to the society. On observing the ground reality of Punalvasal, our students learned the value of self-contentment and to be more

selfless, and they realized that they should be moulded as men and women for others. This immersive experience enhanced the confidence of the students to raise above all odds and gave them hope to face all situations. In the afternoon, students were sent to interact with the students of St.ArockiaAnnaiHr.Sec.School in groups of three to guide and encourage them in creating a better society and a fruitful future for themselves as well. The outreach program concluded with a valedictoryceremony.

Relief camp at Thiruthuraipoondi

November 30 -December, 2018

DAY 1 - NOV 30

The students of Loyola College (MLT, DJ and MATHS) started their journey at 10pm on 30th of November and reached ST Antony's School, Thiruthuraipoondi at 7am. The inaugural session was started at 10am in the presence of ST Antony's school management, outreach coordinators, department staffs and students. At 11:30am students and staff went to Veeranagar, a nearby slum which is affected by GAJA cyclone for relief works. The students interacted with the people of the affected and volunteered to clean up their living environment. Later the members of local Municipal Corporation joined and rendered their support. At 2:30pm the students returned back to school, had lunch and a small break. At 6:15pm the students gathered and had an icebreaking session and the rules were briefed to them. Later they were divided into five groups and were entrusted with documentation, time management, food committee, prayer committee, cleaning and sanitation respectively. At 9pm the dinner was served and the day came to an end.

DAY 2 1-12-2018

The students began the day with one hour of physical exercise (jogging and exercise) followed by tea and breakfast. The school where the students stayed (St.Antony's Hr Sec School) was visited by the Loyola Disaster Committee. Fr. Andrew S.J, the Principal of Loyola College addressed the students on Jesuit education, followed by Fr. Justin S.J on 3H (head, hand, heart) and at last Fr. Louis interacted with the students after having delightful exchanges followed by group photo and cake distribution. Later, the students dispersed for lunch. The students were then taken to Punjayoor, one of the worst affected places by the cyclone, where no relief materials had reached earlier. The students interacted with the villagers to know the needs of the people and collected details about the damage in the affected areas. On interacting, the students were informed that there was no disaster relief measures taken by the government. They also said that it would take a minimum of five to ten years for their lives to become normal. After spending quality time with the people of the village, the students came back to the school. The students shared their experience. The day came to an end with the dinner and separating and packing of relief materials into individual family packages.

DAY 3, 03 December 2018

The students began the day with short session of prayer and meditation at 7am. Breakfast was served and everyone left for the village visit from the school. The student teams were sent to different parts of the cyclone affected village (Sembiyavelur , Pazhayangudi , Nandampallam panchayat of Nagapattinam district) for an interactive session with the villagers. The students were guided by the local heads. On interacting with the people students learnt that the level of damage caused by the cyclone was much greater than expected. Many were left homeless even without basic amenities and medication. They also stated that their farmlands which was the only source of income was destroyed completely. Though the people were suffering to meet their basic needs they rendered whatever they had in their homes to students and exhibited outstanding hospitality. Upon further interaction the students came to know that it would take atleast a month for electricity to be restored. Although many peoples built up their lives after cyclone, still some families are struggling to recover. The students had their lunch at the government school located at the village. After spending a few more hours with the villagers, the students returned to the scholl where they stayed and shared their experience. The students had dinner and packed the individual relief packages to be distributed to the cyclone affected people.

<u>Day 4 – 04th December, 2018</u>

The day started with prayer and meditation session at 7:00 am followed by breakfast. All the packed relief materials were divided into two groups (165+300) to be distributed to the cyclone affected areas, which were visited and analysed by the students in the previous visits. The students of team 3 & 5 with approximately 165 relief packages went to punjayur village that was badly affected by cyclone. The relief materials (165) were distributed in three different parts of the village as 70+70+12 packages respectively. Students handed over the packages to each family with immense pleasure and satisfaction, the smile of the people lightened the students hearts. Team 1, 2 & 4 along with more than 300 relief packages went to Sembiyavelur of Nagapattinam district to distribute the relief materials. The students distributed the packages to individual houses with whom they had interacted during the previous days. The people accepted the relief materials and showed their After distribution, the students had their lunch at the local gratitude . government school and returned to their place of stay at 5:00pm. After relaxing, the students gathered and shared their experiences. The students sat together to put down their experiences of interacting and distributing the relief materials in creative ways by making posters. The day ended with supper.

Day-5 5th December

The day started with the students assembling for prayer and meditation. Breakfast was served and the agenda for the day was announced to the students. The students visited the areas adjacent to the school and interacted with the people to know more about their immediate needs. The students were split into groups and set in different directions around the school and got to know the needs of the people. The students returned to the school and had their lunch. After lunch, they carried the relief materials along with them and went to the various houses that they had visited earlier and distributed the materials. Valedictory was help at 4 PM in which the chairman of the school and all the staffs were honoured by staffs and students of Loyola College. The students left the school premises at 7.30 PM after dinner and boarded the train to Chennai at Mannarkudi station. The students arrived at Chennai egmore station at 6.30 AM on 6th December.
